Dealing with a difficult day

Yesterday I ran into a plot hole. I found that two pieces of information that connected to a third added up to a premature revelation. One of my characters, who runs a conspiracy website, was bound to put the two together - and if he didn't, there were others on the case, including the mainstream media. In my story, that story was breaking too soon.

(Yes, I have an outline. Yes, the story deviates from it. Sometimes you have to go with the story.)

Right now the story wasn't going anywhere. The usual displacement activities offered themselves. Go for a walk. Do some housework. Read. Snooze. What I did was go online and look at a moderately conspiratorial website (Kurt Nimmo's 'Another Day in the Empire') and follow a trail from sites it linked to, to sites they linked to, and so on. The first stop was 'Scholars for 9/11 Truth'. There I read some articles which claimed that the WTC towers were brought down by controlled explosions, after the planes hit. Reading through them, I could see a certain initial plausibility, undermined by straw men and overlooked points and glaring non sequiturs ... and that site linked to another, which claimed that whatever hit the towers, hijacked airliners didn't ... and from there, it didn't take many one-link hops to get to aliens on Earth, fake Moon landings, and holocaust denial. Uh-oh. Right.

But the controlled demolition claim sent me downstairs to do something I've never done before. On the night of September 11 2001 and the early morning of the following day, I had the TV tuned permanently to news channels and the video set to record. So I blew dust off the box, stuck the tape in and watched every video clip of the planes hitting and the towers falling. Fast-forward through the talking heads on CNN and BBC News 24, play the clips, rewind, slo-mo, fast-forward again ... and I began to see why some people could believe extraordinary claims. Patrick Nielsen Hayden said, on the day, that it was like living in a Ken MacLeod novel (to which I replied that it was like living in a Jack Womack novel). But to many people, then and since, it's been like living in Philip K. Dick novel. You look at the television and you think, *this is not really happening*. And, as I found by replaying the tapes, it *still* looks unreal.

One of the reasons why those of us who watched the news that day were so profoundly shocked was that what we saw didn't match what we expected. It didn't fit what we thought we knew about physics. What it seemed to fit was Hollywood physics, and cartoon physics. I remember saying at the time, 'It looks like a disaster

movie. It looks like a special effect'; and - of the airliner-cross-section-shaped hole in one of the towers - 'It looks like a cartoon ... like when the cat crashes through a fence and leaves a cat-shaped hole'. Even the second airliner flying in - that unforgettable black silhouette - looks like a cardboard cutout. I remember exactly what I imagined when I heard, on the phone, that both towers were down. I had seen the towers just a couple of months earlier, and had recalled the bomb attack of 1993, and - with a shiver on a hot July day - had imagined the towers toppling. That was what I imagined again, when I first heard they'd fallen. Instead, they collapsed straight down. It does sort of look like a controlled demolition. But does that mean it is one? No, as we'll see in a moment.

Play, rewind, slo-mo ... when the second tower falls, you *do* see a straight line of flames exploding from a row of windows at the bottom of the section where the collapse starts ... rewind, slo-mo ... just before it moves, you can see a red glow of fire behind the same row of windows. What you're seeing is the fire that gets pushed out, with enormous force, as the floors above fall on it.

One picture I saw on the net troubled me. It shows a woman standing in the airliner-shaped hole, looking out. That, surely, must be faked? A Google search on 'WTC woman photo hoax' didn't turn it up, but it did turn up other 9/11 conspiracy sites. Some of these very convincingly debunked the controlled demolition claim (and the other, wilder claims). The 'official story' of the fall of the towers is one of a real scandal, which is that the steel support of the towers was fire-protected by coverings that turned out to be all too easily blasted or torn off, instead of with concrete cladding. It's concrete cladding that has enabled other skyscrapers to stand worse fires, and its absence that made the towers collapse. Or so *that* story goes.

What was more interesting, to me at that moment, was that these other conspiracy sites - which made yet other inflammatory allegations - argued that some at least of the sites I'd looked at earlier were, by making wild claims and linking to reprehensible or ridiculous views, working consciously or unwittingly to discredit the *real* critical investigations of 9/11. To the serious conspiracy theorist, the crackpot conspiracy theorist is, whether he or she knows it or not, part of the coverup.

I already knew that conspiracy theory is a wilderness of mirrors. But I needed the reminder. My immediate plot problem is solved, and I can get on with writing - just as soon as I've finished writing this.

HOTEL INFORMATION.

The venue is the **Quality Hotel, Bentley, Walsall**, which is situated next to junction 10 of the M6. The nearest railway station is Walsall, and the nearest Intercity station is Wolverhampton. Full travel details will appear in PR3.

The Quality has 150 twin/double rooms and no singles. However a number of the rooms will be released to us as singles, but these are limited and so if you particularly want a single **please book early** as they will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

ROOM RATES:

Twin/doubles: £36 per person per night.

Singles: £48 p.p.p.n.

Both include full English breakfast

There are also a number of suites which are suitable as family rooms. Children aged 5-12 years will be charged at £10 per night inc. breakfast, while children under 5 years will be accommodated free of charge.

BREAKFAST:

We have arranged with the hotel that breakfast vouchers will be issued this year. If you miss breakfast the voucher will entitle you to a free baguette from the bar.

LEISURE FACILITIES:

All residents will be entitled to full use of the hotel's Leisure Club facilities including swimming pool, spa-bath, sauna, gymnasium and solarium (hopefully, all will be fully functional this year!).

DUPLICATE ROOM KEYS:

For those of you sharing a room the hotel can provide each person with a room key, but please let us know in advance. This does not apply to suites, which have a different type of lock to the rest of the rooms and don't allow

the hotel to make copies. If you each want a key let the hotel know on arrival as they will be programming a number of rooms to take duplicate keys in advance of the convention and buying in key sets especially for us. Once you have a key each don't lose it! If you do then a new set of keys will have to be issued, and your sharer's key won't work anymore as soon as you use your new one. Of course if you do not have a key each and you can't find your sharer, you can still get into the room by asking hotel reception to let you in with a Master key, but please don't get them doing this all the time. The hotel will need to see your key card as proof of identity, so carry it at all times. You may also need it to charge drinks to your room, and at breakfast.

OVERFLOW HOTELS:

For those of you who want a single, but don't book in time, or those of you who are strapped for cash, there is an overflow hotel nearby. This is the **Travel Inn**, 10 minutes' walk away from the Quality. Rooms are currently £48.95 Mon-Thurs and £45.95 Fri-Sun, **excluding** breakfast. Bear in mind that this rate is for the **room**, regardless of how many people are in it! Many of their rooms will accommodate 2 adults and 2 children. It's up to you to book here and you can visit on

Alternatively, you can book a room at the Village Hotel, which is on the other side of the motorway, towards Walsall. Bear in mind that you will have to cross J10 to get to and from here, so think bus or taxi.
